Globally, men have higher rates of informal employment than women. However, in 56% of countries, rates of informal employment for women are higher. Women's rates of informal employment are higher than men's in the lower-income countries. Lower rates of employment and/or informal employment for women in many emerging countries contribute to the higher global average for men.

By Status in Employment

Globally, 56% of all workers are wage employed, while 44% are self-employed. However, among the world's informal workers, 64% are self-employed.



By Status in Employment

Among informal workers, women are much more likely than men to be contributing family workers, the most vulnerable category of self-employment. Conversely, men are more likely than women to be employers, the best-off category, though few men or women are employers. Men are more likely than women to be own account workers, another vulnerable category of self-employment. These differences are seen across all country income levels as well as in total employment.

By Branch of Industry

In developing countries, informal employment is predominantly in agriculture; in emerging and developed countries, it is predominantly in services. In all regions, the lowest percentage of informal employment is in manufacturing. The percentage distribution of total employment is the same as of informal employment.

By Age Group

Globally, the share of informal employment in total employment is higher among young workers (age 15-24) and older workers (age 65+) than among other adult workers (age 25-64). In developing countries, almost everyone who is working in the younger and older age groups is informally employed.
